

Mike is a lifelong resident of Wakefield and a 1976 graduate of Wakefield High where he played football, basketball and baseball. He was a member of the 1973 Middlesex League Championship Football Team as well as the 1974-75 and 1975-76 Middlesex League Championship Basketball Teams.

Mike received his Bachelors degree from Springfield College and a Masters degree from Salem State College. He has been employed in the Wakefield School System his entire career and is currently the Director of Athletics and Student Activities at Wakefield High.

This past season marked Mike's 30th year coaching football at Wakefield High and his 15th season as head coach. In addition to his duties as head coach, Mike serves as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach.

As head coach, his teams have won 6 Middlesex League Championships and played in 4 Super Bowls. In his first season as head coach, his team played in Wakefield's first Super Bowl in school history. In just his third season, his team won Wakefield's first Super Bowl Championship defeating Acton-Boxboro in 1999.

Mike holds the all time coaching record at Wakefield High for wins with 112 and winning percentage at 70%. Mike's overall record as head coach at Wakefield is 112-46-3. As head coach, Mike has coached 11 All-Scholastic players, 4 All-State players, one All-American and 5 Eastern Mass. Football Foundation Scholar-Athletes.

Some of Coach Boyages' accolades include: Middlesex League Coach of the Year, School Sports Coach of the Year, Daily Times Chronicle Fall Coach of the Year, Nike Massachusetts Division II Coach of the Year and Shriners Head Coach.

Mike attributes his success as the direct result of having hard working players with great attitudes and a very dedicated and caring coaching staff. Mike states, "I've always emphasized the importance of being a 'family' and teaching life lessons to all of our players. It's so much more than just football in our program. My greatest reward as a coach has been seeing players mature and grow as people not just as football players. I feel I've done my job if a player leaves our football program as a better person than when he came in. I feel extremely lucky to have spent my entire coaching career in my hometown at Wakefield High with outstanding young men and a very talented coaching staff."
